## Program Impact

Through a focus on sustainability and community engagement, we've made significant progress in addressing food-related challenges and enhancing the well-being of our clients.

We've revamped our operational processes to boost efficiency and expand our program reach. Strategic partnerships with local businesses and volunteers have optimized our supply chain and distribution, enabling us to better meet the growing demand for our services.

Our approach has had a dual economic impact. Firstly, by managing resources efficiently, we've streamlined operational costs, allowing more funds to be directed to our programs. Secondly, through skill-building and employment opportunities, we've empowered community members to both contribute to and benefit from our initiatives, fostering sustainability and ownership within the community.

Central to our success is the positive impact on our clients. Our programs not only provide access to nutritious food but also offer educational resources and support services. Community cooking classes and nutrition workshops have boosted food literacy and empowered clients to make informed choices about their well-being, as evidenced by personal success stories.

Our programs go beyond food assistance; they create a sense of community and collaboration. Activities like our Learning Kitchen, Community Gardens, and Growing Programs bring people together, forming a support network that addresses not just food insecurity but also fosters ongoing community involvement and awareness.

We've noted a growing need for sustainable practices, increased nutrition awareness, and heightened concerns for food security in the ever-evolving food landscape. The global pandemic highlighted vulnerabilities, particularly among certain populations. In response, we've adapted our programs by incorporating sustainable farming, expanding educational initiatives, and targeting outreach efforts to vulnerable communities, such as Kingsclear First Nation, St. Mary's First Nation, John Howard Society of Fredericton, 12 Neighbours Community, and populations experiencing extreme housing insecurity.

We've proactively addressed emerging trends by introducing innovative programs. For example, our sustainable Growing Programs promote long-term food security and environmental responsibility. Virtual platforms have expanded our outreach, ensuring accessibility during challenging times. Collaborations with other organizations fighting food insecurity have strengthened future plans, addressing holistic client needs through comprehensive services.

At Greener Village, our commitment to operational efficiency, economic empowerment, and client impact is evident in our programs and services. By staying responsive to food trends and embracing adaptability and innovation, we continue to positively impact our community. Our success stories and collaborative spirit reflect the dedication of our staff and the strength of our community partnerships.

# Program Impact... Beyond Food!



"I drove to Fredericton early this morning to pick up a [grocery] box... full of surprises! I never expected oranges, then again, I had no expectations. Real milk, fresh veggies, carrots, greens for salads, fresh fruit, meat, eggs, canned fish, canned goods, crackers, rolls, peanut butter, coffee... Many of the items I can stretch... ## Learning Kitchen

The learning kitchen is a place for people from the community including clients, local businesses and individuals to gather and know more about the organization as well as create meaningful connections with each other. This space allows people to work with a red seal chef to learn essential food skills, reduce food waste and make their groceries last longer. Here are some examples of initiatives at the Learning Kitchen.



## Collective Kitchens (for clients only)

In late 2023, Greener Village introduced a free initiative for our clients – the Collective Kitchen event. This ongoing program empowers clients to craft healthy, nutritious meals using ingredients from their kitchens and grocery boxes. The response has been encouraging, with both of the initial Collective Kitchen events completely selling out. Each session can accommodate up to 12 clients. The initiative offers several benefits for our clients:

**Collaborative Meal Prep:** Tackling meal prep alone can be overwhelming. However, with a friend or two, it becomes a shared endeavor resulting in a fridge stocked with ready-to-eat meals and the bonus of newfound friendships.

**Educational Experience:** The Collective Kitchen transforms learning into a lively community affair. From mastering basic skills like chopping onions to tackling more advanced culinary tasks such as cooking scallops, the sessions are designed to be simple yet informative. They also provide a fantastic platform for exploring new cuisines and recipes.

**Maximizing Grocery Value:** Clients participating in these sessions have shared how the classes have enabled them to extend the utility of their grocery boxes for up to two weeks, a noteworthy improvement from the typical 7-10 days.

The success of the Collective Kitchen initiative underscores Greener Village's commitment to fostering community engagement, promoting food literacy, and maximizing the impact of our services. This initiative will also be regularly scheduled in our learning kitchen for the year 2024.



## Bread Mondays (open to the public)

Launched in 2023, Bread Mondays is not just an initiative; it's a dynamic community connection with a dual focus:

**Community Skill Hub:** Every Monday, the community gathers to learn a new skill for free while doing good; creating an electric atmosphere of engagement.

**Fresh Food Boost:** Beyond skill-building, Bread Mondays contributes to our grocery hampers, ensuring clients get a taste of fresh, homemade goodness.

At Greener Village, we want to look at food differently—Bread Mondays is a chance for community members to volunteer, while refining their bread-making skills, and making a difference. Each week, the dedicated volunteers whip up fresh loaves, making a tangible impact on our community. It's more than just baking; it's about building bonds while championing our Food Bank baskets. In 2023, the ovens were hot, and 5,089 loaves later, Bread Mondays made a real difference! So much so that the program got the attention of the Washington Post who ran a story on Bread Mondays, how's that for impact?

## Stone Soup Society

Launched in 2023, Stone Soup Society cooks up fresh meals for our clients. The goal of this activity is to nurture and nourish our Food Bank clients with wholesome and delicious soup from our dedicated volunteers. Simply put: make soup, share soup, and give soup.

In 2023, we hosted 10 Stone Soup Society events. Participants pay a \$25 donation to learn how to make new soup recipes, and take home 1 liter of soup created during the event. The remaining soup is added as an extra to food baskets for our clients.

## Team Building Workshops (open to groups)

Team building activities at the learning kitchen is a great opportunity for local businesses to have fun and work together, learning an essential skill while satisfying their taste buds. Moreover, hands-on shared cooking events with our Red Seal chef Yves Dechaine helps foster camaraderie and teamwork, which promote better communication and performance in the workplace. In 2023, we hosted 9 groups for team building workshops.

Funds raised with these classes are used to purchase food for the clients and serve the community.

## Commercial Kitchen Partnerships

As a part of providing fresh and nutritious food to our clients, we have a Class 5 kitchen and a Red Seal chef on staff. This allows us to rent out the space to small businesses who are in the early stages of developing their business and are looking for a place to prepare their products. A few success stories borne out of our space:

- Fernando's Gourmet Sausages rents our kitchen space to make sausage links that are sold to Simply for Life stores in 3 different locations
- Jett's Puff Pies make and bake their hand pies in our kitchen for all their catering events and any product they sell wholesale.
- Smoking Jon's BBQ used the kitchen to test and scale new products.

# Support Programs



## School Backpack Program

This annual program takes place in August. With support from the community and corporate sponsors, we are able to provide children with backpacks filled with school essentials based on their age-group. Each backpack contains supplies that students require for the new school year, such as pens, pencils, notebooks, binders, math kits, and a calculator. Backpacks are assembled and distributed with the help of our amazing volunteers!

In 2023, 534 school backpacks were distributed to school aged children and youth in the Greater Fredericton community.



## Unique Boutique

Unique Boutique, Greener Village's social enterprise thrift store directly supports our community by Turning Fashion Into Food. For every dollar spent, we can provide \$2 worth of food to those in need. Doubling as a support to our clients, we also issue gift cards to the boutique to provide clothing and other household essentials to those in need.

**Gross sales (2023):** \$277,174.53

**Net sales (2023):** \$162,022.53



## Tax Clinic

We acknowledge that Food insecurity is a bigger issue than just lack of healthy and nutritious food. Many of the people in the community also struggle with access to services like tax filing. Through the Community Volunteer Income Tax Program (CVITP), community organizations like ours host free tax clinics where volunteers complete tax returns for people with a modest income and a simple tax situation. Greener Village verifies completeness of the forms and submits them to a community volunteer. Last year, over 200 members of our community accessed this critical service.

## Partnerships with Local Businesses: Blueberry Block Party

We are so grateful for all the initiatives organized by local businesses that help us raise funds for the community. The Blueberry Block party was one such event hosted by Mill Town Roasters in September 2023, this event was all about coming together to support Greener Village. From 9am-5pm at The Landing in Marysville, visitors enjoyed live music, tasty blueberry treats, and had a chance to shop for a cause by purchasing items from the Unique Boutique. This served as another opportunity to both sell items and promote Greener Village.

## Campaign Impact

New Brunswick faces a dual challenge with soaring food prices and escalating food waste rates. Concurrently, 22.7% of residents report food insecurity, with a concerning 29.4% of children living in food insecure homes. In response, Greener Village has provided essential resources for four decades, but recent economic challenges have caused a 70% surge in demand for its services, distributing 125,000 meals monthly.

A 2018 study found that up to 58% of Canadian produce is discarded, yet 32% is salvageable. In Atlantic Canada, 457 million pounds of food annually could be rescued, reducing greenhouse gas emissions. This underscores the need for concerted efforts to tackle food waste and insecurity.

Greener Village is building Atlantic Canada's first Perishable Food Rescue Centre (PFRC) to reclaim food and revolutionize food security. The PFRC will process, prepare, and store bumper crops, creating \$4 million in fresh food yearly while diverting waste. By partnering with Food Depot Alimentaire (FDA) Greener Village will redistribute rescued food to over 70 food related charities across New Brunswick and help reduce carbon emissions.

The PFRC will be constructed on Greener Village's existing property, featuring a renovated building and a new secondary structure with a large food preparation kitchen, cold storage, and workshop rooms. The \$4.3 million project, set for Fall 2024, will re-imagine how our provincial food system flows.
